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Caracole is proud of its 25 years of service and new offoices

Caracole marked its 25th anniversary with "A Singular Sensation" dinner in June at the Hilton Cincinnati Netherland Plaza, downtown Cincinnati.

About Caracole, Inc.

Caracole saw a 330% increase in the number of clients served in 2011. Caracole served 881 people living with HIV/AIDS in 2011 and served 205 clients in 2010. In addition, they served more than 94 additional partners and children of clients.

Caracole saw a 92% increase in the Client Services employees in 2011. To accommodate their new clients, Caracole hired 11 new Client Services employees in 2011.

Caracole saw a 28% increase in expenditures for 2011. With so many new clients and employees that started with Caracole on April 1, 2011, an additional \$524,258 in expenditures were necessary.

Caracole served seven new counties in 2011, compared to 2010. Caracole now serves Adams, Brown, Butler, Clermont, Clinton, Hamilton, Highland, and Warren Counties.

History of Caracole, Inc.

In 1987, the HIV/AIDS epidemic was becoming less of a whispered disease and more of a national dialogue. The national face of AIDS that year was an Indiana teenager named Ryan White, and that fall that the AIDS Memorial Quilt was first

displayed on the National Mall in Washington, D.C.

It was against that background that Caracole House was founded in 1987, the first licensed adult care facility in Ohio for people living with HIV/AIDS. But according to Linda Seiter, the executive director of Caracole, the idea came several months earlier.

"In February of 1986, Father Jeremy Harrington and Father Jim Van Vurst with the Province of St. John the Baptist approached Michael Ritchey, the director of the Cincinnati Health Department's sexually transmitted disease unit to discuss conducting a feasibility study on the need for housing for those with HIV/AIDS," said Seiter. "The study showed that those infected would need supportive housing. Caracole was incorporated soon after."

In his history of the organization, Ritchey explained the background behind the name. "Caracole is derived from the Spanish word for snail, or it can also refer to a shell or protective covering," he wrote. "The concept of a shell, a home and protection against the environment, is an important one. "Caracole's sole mission was, and remains, to provide good comfortable housing for persons with AIDS who are in need."

While housing is the foundation of the organization, Seiter

says the outreach has grown as patients no longer see HIV/ AIDS as an automatic death sentence. "When permanent housing services were added, we began providing case management services to assist people in obtaining medications, maintaining housing and medical care and connecting to other needed services."

And clients can have more than one need. "The typical client may be a person living with HIV/AIDS who comes for case management services so they have support with getting medications and other services to maintain good health and independence," said Seitzer. "The client also may be a homeless person in need of housing and medical stabilization, if they're coming from a shelter or living on the street with inconsistent

or no medical care. For a client like this, their health care begins with stable housing.'

As the organization marks its 25th anniversary this year, Seiter says the need is greater than ever, as Caracole now serves an eight-county area

with the number of clients increasing 330 percent last year. "This jump in numbers happened because we were awarded a grant from the Ohio Department of Health to provide all Ryan White medical case management services that were

previously provided by another agency," she said. "The increase in clients also means an increase in the need for volunteers. We've grown from a volunteer base of about 75 last year to a current roster of 165. And more are always welcome."

Caracole moving to Northside

Caracole, having outgrown its Bond Hill office, is moving to Northside.

Their new offices and meeting space will be on the first floor of the former Miller Funeral Home on Hamilton Av-

David White, community development officer for Caracole, said they will be open for business on June 29 and they will be closed to

their clients and the public on June 27 and 28 for the move.

He said when they decided to move Northside was a good fit because it is more centrally located and is on or near several bus routes.

Located there will be offices for case managers, housing staff and administrative staff. There will be 28 Caracole staff members and two Planned Parenthood staff members with offices

in the building.

Planned Parenthood will house their HIV Prevention Project doing HIV testing there.

They have two owned transitional houses in Roselawn which will stay there. There are 22 beds available.

An Open House is planned for late July. Entrance is from the back of the building and there is a large parking lot.

There were no "goodie packet bags", since so many times the contents end up in the trash. We used local companies Bruegger's Bagels for bagels and Kroger for bananas. Northsiders were encouraged to car pool or ride their bikes to the event (bike racks courtesy of MoBo).

FDA approved compostable paper water cups were used, and people were offered the chance to "re-use" and wear one of their past 5k t-shirts for the event. Volunteers were

June Averous—1920-2012

June Averous, 91, a former secretary of Northside Community Council, died in April.

Before moving to Judson Village Retirement Center she lived on Pullan Avenue.

She was born in 1921. Her family lived about 15 miles from Paris, France but her mother made a special trip by train so she would be born in Mazamet in southern France. the same town as were her ancestors.

This was very important because her family was traditional Huguenots (*Protestant*) a minority of about two percent.

She studied to be a teacher but the year she got her teaching certificate, her father died and she postponed her plans to care for her mother.

She was 19 when Hitler entered Paris. Then a secretary, in her quiet way, she helped Jewish and other neighbors targeted by Hitler escape the country through Mazamet.

She worked for the French Post Office for years and visited a restaurant where she met John Eick, a teacher at Xavier University here. Eick would take students to Paris and they stayed in the home Averous inherited from her family.

In 1969 she retired and came to the United States at the invitation of Eick.

They bought a house on Pullan, she lived on the first floor, Eick upstairs.

She was secretary of the Northside Community Council when Dr. Richard Jameson was its president.

She was a member of Pilgrim Chapel in Mt. Adoms where her memorial service was held.

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
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
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Rainbow Band's annual concert at Kiwanis Memorial Day Ceremony

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
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Clifton's Memorial Day Parade

Preparing the mushrooms

Ingredients: 1 lb mushrooms....2 tablespoons minced scallions or onions....1 clove minced garlic....1 quarter cup dry white wine....1 cup shredded mozzarella cheese (provolone is even better)....1 teaspoon Wondra flour.....

Directions: Wash and drain mushrooms, use caps only, save stems for another recipe....Sautee scallions or onions in butter until limp....add wine and simmer for 5 minutes....Put mushrooms in bake and serve dish....Pour wine mixture over mushrooms....Bake for 12 minutes at 450 degrees (microwave, 4-6 minutes)....Remove from oven and pour off liquid into saucepan....Simmer mixture until it reduces to one half cup, thickening it with flour....Pour mixture over mushrooms in same bake and serve dish....put back in oven for 5 minutes.... put cheese over mushrooms, let bake for 3 minutes or until cheese melts....Voila, Muchrooms Mozzarella, Muy Delicioso!
