#### Porch Tour October 12th will launch from St. Boniface, celebrating 150 years in Northside

Northside Community Council is busy planning for the 9<sup>th</sup> bi-annual Historic Porch Tour October 12th, 6-9 p.m., set to launch from St. Boniface School. The Porch Tour this year is planned to compliment St. Boniface's 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary in Northside.

Designed to be a streetscape celebration of the Victorian Porches that

proliferate our neighborhood, the Porch Tour has been a huge success in building community street by street within the neighborhood. In it's ninth year, there has been a different route every time for the Porch Tour as the event dances around the neighborhood.

Returning to St. Boniface for the launching point this year was destined to happen when St. Boniface contacted me to be a part of their 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

Things like this do not happen every day, nor do they happen every year. Back in 1853, St. Aloysius Church was founded on the current-day Delaney Street (*Linn Street*) to serve the spiritual needs of Catholics in Cummins-ville. Due to the construction of the Miami-Erie Canal, Cumminsville

grew rapidly, and many Irish and German immigrants poured into this area to settle. This caused the rapid growth of St. Aloysius Church, and a decision was made to split the parish along ethnic lines (Irish and *German*), with the Irish getting St. Aloysius (*later* to become St. Patrick Church, then St Pius, and now Queen City Cookies). This left the Germans building St.

1863 (the current site of Ridge Engineering). The continual growth of the north side of Cumminsville resulted in the Germans outgrowing their location on Blue Rock and Lakeman, and so they built a new church on the Banning estate, located on Pitts and Chase Streets, in 1927. Suburban migration that started in the post-war years forced St. Patrick Church to

in 1991.

What is certain though, is on the second Saturday night in October, the sun will set, there will be thousands of luminaries lining a route in Northside that twotwenty person horse drawn carriages will traverse, architectural interpretations of the Victorian Porches will accompany the carriages, people will be out celebrating their neighborhood on their porches dressed in period costume, and as the night settles in, the candles will fade in their little white bags as the successful event brings light and energy to another street in Northside.



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## Well known Northsider Jan Holland has died

Jan was a long time resident of Hayes Avenue in Northside. For many years she was a Ward Chairman and member of the Executive Committee of the Democratic Party in Hamilton County.

She was a lifelong member of the St. Philip's Episcopal Church on Kirby Road.

Jan was very active with the Northside-College Hill Kiwanis. She was President for many years and most recently served as Vice-President of the Club. She often said that she felt that "everyone should be a Kiwanian".

Jan's passions included the Kiwanis, her church, service veterans, and her cats. She felt so strongly about the veterans that she pushed for the Kiwanis Club to build a mobile Veterans Wall. It is currently located at the Postmans' Hall on Colerain Avenue and Blue Rock in Northside.

She was also the power behind the Kiwanis Club sponsoring the Memorial Day Service at Wesleyan Cemetery.

The world wasn't always fair to Jan, but she always tried her best and she will be missed. Her faith in God helped her through the many challenges she faced and we can be assured that she is with her savior in heaven.

## Dr. Bob

#### Older pets and "procedures"

**Downtown**—Hello folks. Today I would like to go over with you a big concern that all loving pet owners have. This really comes into play as our pets get older and the idea of getting some 'procedure' done is mentioned at the veterinary clinic.

It is a very pervasive concern and one that is hard to overcome, but a little information and intelligence usually saves the day.

Okay, let's go with a hypothetical. YBy Dr. Robert Biedeour veterinarian mentions that little Oscar needs an operation. What's the first thing that comes to your mind? If you said, "The cost!",

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then pat yourself on the back for being responsible (But that's not the right answer!) No indeed. What we're looking for concerning the right answer is it safe to put little Oscar under anesthesia?" (Give yourself a gold star if that was your reply.)

Now granted, it is always best to avoid drugs, surgery etc. if possible; but if your veterinarian decides that surgery or some procedure is warranted, and that sedation/ anesthesia is required; the medications we veterinarians have at our disposal today are immensely

more safe than what was around a few short years ago.

There are many types of anesthetic agents, but for the sake of simplicity, we will break them down into the two main groups of A) gas anesthetics and the B) injectable drugs. Which one is better? Well I would imagine you could ask five different doctors and get five different answers to the issue. Gas has been the all-time favorite, but lately even the internal specialists I have talked to will say the injectables are just as safe, if not safer.

Gas anesthetics can be 'neutralized' by infusing more oxygen into the lungs. Many of the injectable anesthetics these days now have their own specific 'antidotes' that can be given intravenously if needed. What this means is that if a patient 'gets into trouble,'

we can get them out of trouble quite readily. Within a matter of seconds, anesthetics can be diminished, if not completely negated.

The safety of these drugs is indeed remarkable. Last summer I had a little kitten that weighed just fourteen ounces (That's right-less than a pound), who had a severe eye infection at birth. Unfortunately, the eye had to be removed. Lucky

> Here are the few simple ingredients for Barbara's "Cocoa Delight": 3 cups non fat dry milk 1 cup

unsweetened cocoa powder 1 cup sugar (I prefer brown sugar), for the carb and calorie concious, Stevia is a healthy alternative. 1 teaspoon salt Put all ingredients in a large mixing bowl Stir until mixture is thoroughly incorporated Cocoa mix can be stored in a tightly sealed container, in a cool dry place for up to 2 months. For 1 single



serving: 3 Tbsp. mix in 1 cup hot water, for a richer cocoa, use milk in place of water. Now let's get creative Top hot cocoa with a dollop of whipped cream chocolate and

shavings. Chocolate morsels can be used as well. I found chocolate raspberry morsels in a gourmet food shop, simply divine. Try a big fluffy marshmallow on top with graham crackers on the side, s'mores anyone? Step it up to elegant with a dash of Gran Marnier, Amaretto or a teaspoon of instant coffee. for the pet though, the ability to safely and effectively anesthetize such small creatures is readily available, with proper and effective pain elimination.

So right now you're probably thinking 'Okay Dr. Bob, you're telling us they're safe, just how safe are they?' Well I did the math on this, concerning my practice, last year. I can tell you that I am running one anesthetic fatality per seven thousand anesthetic episodes. Frankly, I would say those are pretty good odds!

Now the fact that anesthetic problems are becoming more and more rare is not just solely because of the newer drugs. This is also due to the fact that blood tests (Just like the humans

do) make it possible to specially tailor anesthesia requirements to each individual pet. For example, older cats with kidney problems will require less, while a dog with a high metabolismmay require more. Everyone gets the proper sleep and pain management they need while still happily going out the door within a day or two.

So while it's okay to be concerned, just don't let the fear of anesthesia prevent you from taking care of your pet. We doctors can never make guarantees, but I can promise your pet will have an exceedingly very good chance of going home safely. All thanks to modern medicine. Now that's something to smile about!
